## Workshop "Supporting workers affected by COVID-19: Lessons from practice"

То:.....

The fourth wave of COVID-19 in Vietnam started in late April 2021 and quickly developed into a severe nationwide pandemic. The national government and local authorities in 19 provinces have imposed strict social blockade measures since July 2021. A large number of formal and informal workers have suffered from job loss or reduction significantly reduced income as a result. Many of those who have lost their jobs, been quarantined, or been infected with the virus are migrant workers. With little or no savings left, many formal and informal workers have relied on support from the government, mass organizations, local authorities, and donations to feed their families, afford medical treatment as well as pay rent.

Contributing to the joint effort of the Government of Vietnam and other organizations, Institute for Development & Community Health (LIGHT Institute), Oxfam and other partners have also directly supported workers in some provinces and cities affected by the COVID-19 pandemic in recent months, while also providing recommendations in the process of developing government support policies (Resolution 68/NQ-CP and Decision 23/2021/QD-Ttg).

In this context, LIGHT Institute collaborates with Oxfam in Vietnam to organize the Workshop "Supporting workers affected by COVID-19: Lessons from practice" to share experience about supporting workers affected by COVID-19 and summarise valuable insights when implementing this support; and to share recommendations to support workers in safely recovering and adapting to the COVID-19 pandemic's development and future shocks.
